



## **What can I do to help my child?**

### **What do I do if I have concerns about my child?**

Firstly, speak to your child's teacher. If you still require further advice please:

- 1) Speak to the Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENDCo), Mrs Pang
- 2) Speak to the Additional Needs Lead, Miss Palmer
- 3) Speak to the Head Teacher
- 4) Speak to the SEND Governor, Mrs Glass.

### **How can I help my child at home?**

- Talk to your child all of the time about your daily routine, things that they see around them, things that interest them, meanings of words etc.
- Encourage your child to use correct words and pronunciation
- Encourage your child to use longer sentences, rather than just single words
- Remove dummies from toddlers as soon as possible, so that they are able to talk more and develop their language skills
- Play lots of games at homes, to make learning fun
- Give your child lots of praise / encouragement and celebrate their achievements
- Make time to listen to your child
- Put routines into place at home
- Remain consistent and fair with rewards and sanctions
- Give your child strategies to enable them to develop their independence.
- Practice words and spellings every week
- Share books with your child as often as possible and talk about what is happening in the text and pictures
- Make sure that your child completes all of their homework and hands it in on time
- Ask for support and guidance from the school staff, if you are unsure about anything

- Keep informed about what is happening in school by reading letters, newsletters, text messages and the school website
- Keep school informed about any concerns or changes for your child
- Make sure that your child attends school, as much as possible
- Attend all meetings, Parent Evenings and appointments, whenever possible. Let the school or agency know if you are unable to be there, so that an alternative time can be agreed.
